Parish Pastoral Council Notes

Council Members are: Fr. Kerry, Rosie Rundell, Fr. Carlos, Jolene Amtower, Lucille Johnson, Dennis Kuehler, Cathie Lavis, Pat McCoy, Joe McGraw, Tammy Pachta, Delores Thomas and Ray Buyle. Following are reports from the last meeting.

Adult Ed. & Formation – Rosie reported that there will be a Parish Mission in October of 2017. **MCS:** The STEM coordinator gave a presentation to the school board. Money was raised at the auction to buy 80 chrome books for the school with chargers and installation included. There was a meeting on November 7 at the school with the architect in attendance to answer questions. We have \$1,000,000 in an account with the Diocese and \$500,000 in future pledges. \$1,650,000 is needed to complete the projects on the school planned for next summer. We have permission from the Diocese to spend \$1,500,000. A decision was made for the HVAC for the school. Each classroom will have residential units. **Finance:** Delores reported on the Finance meetings of October 27 and November 17. Copies of the report are available from Fr. Kerry. **Capital Campaign:** In order that we do not have to move out of the church more than one time, the renovations must be done all at the same time. For the heating and cooling there will be Variable Refrigerant Flow cassettes. These are individual, self-contained units that run on refrigerant lines. There will be a meeting of the original Capital Campaign Committee on November 28.

Latino Ministry: Father Carlos reported that there are 34 First Communion students and one third are from Hispanic Families. The sisters are coming from Salina two days a week. There were approximately 160 people at the 12:00 Noon Mass last Sunday. The Hispanic community is mobile. Many come from Junction City where the soldiers are moving in and out regularly so it is hard to form a Hispanic community when they are not here for long. **Commission Reports: Liturgy:** Ramona is working hard getting ready for the Advent Season. **Catholic Formation:** Religious Education classes are full this year. There are 30 in the confirmation class. Confirmation will be held in October 2017. Twenty-two children are in the First Communion Class. **Parish Life:** Jolene told of the plans for the New Year's Eve Celebration. It will be from 9-12 on December 31. Ticket sales will begin in December. **Building & Grounds:** Pat McCoy, Dennis Kuehler, Dale Anderson, Mike Crubel and Richard Bachamp have been cleaning, sorting and tossing items not needed and making good progress in our various buildings. Father Kerry was pleased with the turn-out for cleaning day at the grounds. **Evangelization:** Judy Parks gets names of new parishioners from Margie and she and Lucille have continued to take welcome baskets to them. There will be a Light of the World Retreat at St. Thomas More the end of January. **Social Action (formerly Stewardship):** The Advent giving tree will be in the church entrance the first Sunday of Advent. **New Business:** Pictorial Directory: There has not been a pictorial directory for five years. One is scheduled for this year. Pictures will be taken from May 15 to May 27. The next Pastoral Council meeting will be January 9, 2017.

The Candidates and Catechumens are in what is called the Catechumenate period of their faith journey into the Catholic faith. This extended period is a time in

which they are given suitable pastoral formation and guidance, aimed at training them in the Christian life. If you worship at the 10am Mass on Sunday's, you see the Dismissal Rite as a leader takes them downstairs to Break Open the Word – delving into the Sunday Scriptures and the homily. Why do we do “dismissal?” St. Augustine says in a sermon that the practice would hopefully make them curious. By not participating in the Liturgy of the Eucharist, they would naturally wonder what they are missing. Augustine believed that this intrigue would keep them returning for instruction so that they could one day be admitted to the rest of the Liturgy. In this day and age, it is more importantly seen as an outreach of pastoral care. They are not really “dismissed” from Mass but are “dismissed” into catechesis to help them reflect more deeply on the Word of God and learn to recognize God’s presence in their lives the rest of the week until they are baptized or make their profession of faith. Stewardship Spotlight: Gary & Rebecca Blanton



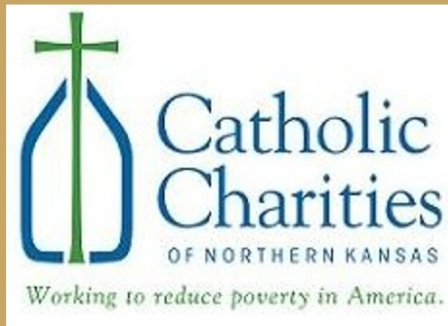

Cremation as a Catholic Practice

Some Thoughts from Fr. Frank Coady

The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF) issued a statement in late October about burial and cremation that reaffirms Catholic teaching on the subject. It was approved by Pope Francis. It does not change any official teaching for American Catholics, who have had similar guidelines on this subject since 1997. The CDF instruction contains some practical dos and don'ts. Cremation is permitted but scattering of ashes is not; keeping ashes in private homes is generally prohibited; making jewelry and keepsakes out of cremated remains is totally forbidden. Nothing new here, but practices coming from the secular culture may have seemed attractive for some Catholics as well.

Let's look at the theology that underlies the document. Catholic traditions about death and burial are shaped by what Catholics believe about Christ and what they believe about the human person. About Christ: his death has infused death itself with new meaning for those who believe; denial of death or avoidance of reminders of death is out of place. About human beings: the human body is part of the person and so is to be treated with reverence even after death. The body is not a "prison" of the soul, nor can it be reduced to a token or a memento of the deceased. We believe in the resurrection of the body, not in reincarnation or the dissolution of the person into the cosmos.

It is also about the Church. Prayer with and for the dead is part of the Church's tradition. Having sacred spaces set aside for burial or entombment encourages and reminds us to pray for those who have gone before us. It is communal: the death of a Christian concerns not only the individual and any living relatives, but is linked with the Communion of Saints that reaches beyond this present generation. In addition, burying the dead is one of the corporal works of mercy.

The Funeral Liturgy, done well and according to the Church's tradition, is meaningful and healing. It brings closure. No one does it better. And burying the dead in a cemetery provides a place where loved ones can go when they feel the need to visit and pray. Even if they never visit, there is the psychological benefit of knowing that there is a "place" where the person's body lies. There is also the spiritual benefit of knowing that, as part of the Rite of Committal, the priest or deacon blessed the ground in which the person is buried.

The instruction comes at a good time. In an age when "memorials" are conducted in place of funerals, and scattering ashes has become commonplace, the emphases surrounding death have begun to change for Catholics. Nowadays sharing memories of the deceased is all important; praying for them is less so. Deciding where to scatter ashes seems like a chance to express the personality of the deceased; laying them in a grave marked with a name, less so.

It is therefore a service to the faithful that the CDF should remind us of the underlying principles of Catholic faith that can and should guide our practice. Fond memories and beautiful places that evoke those memories are fine, but they are not all that matters.

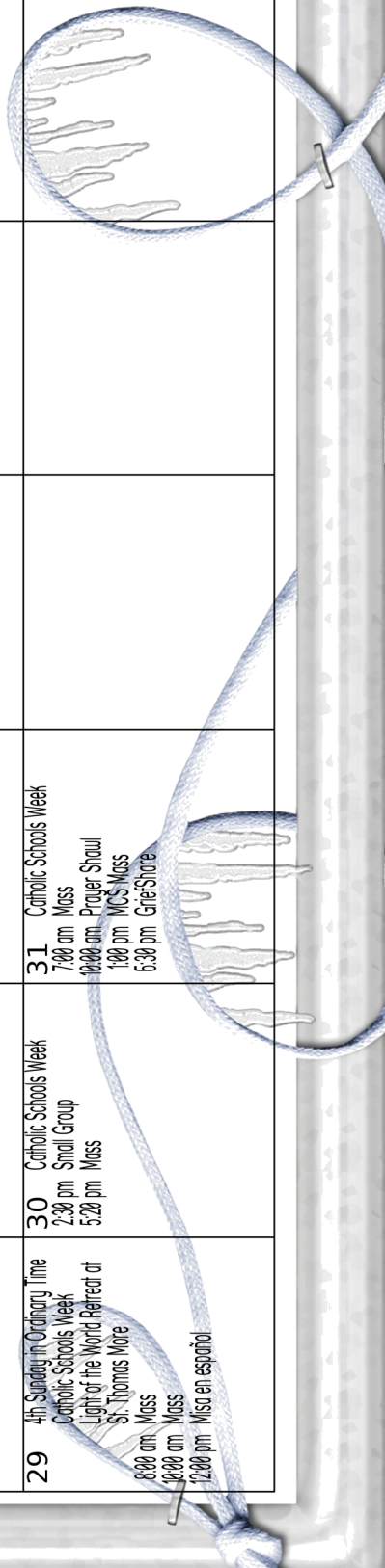
