We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

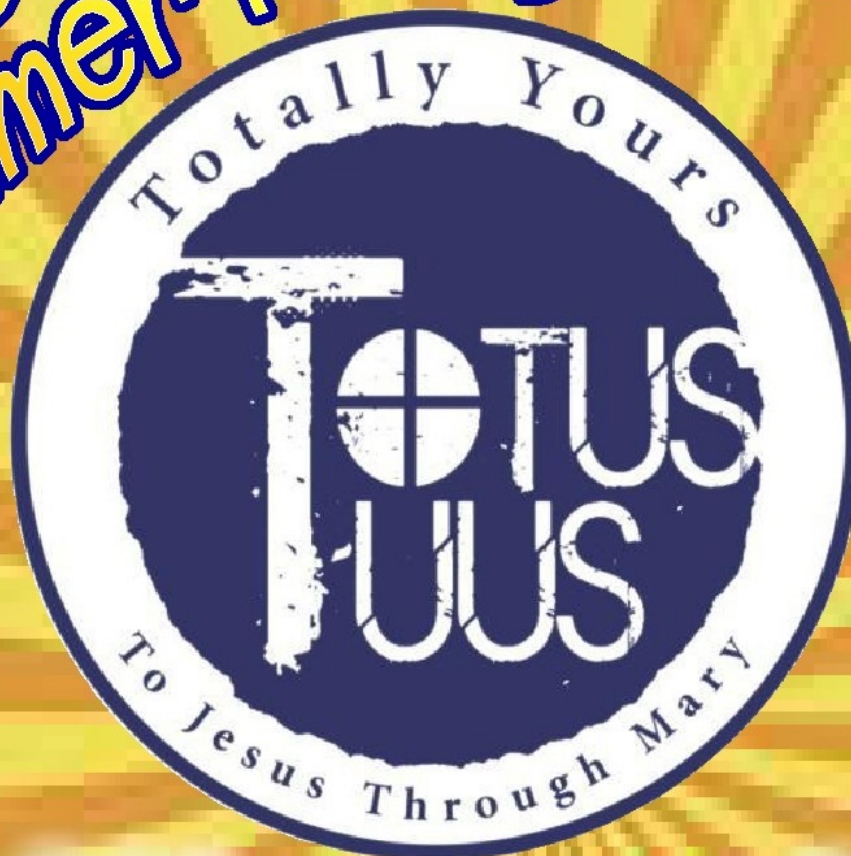

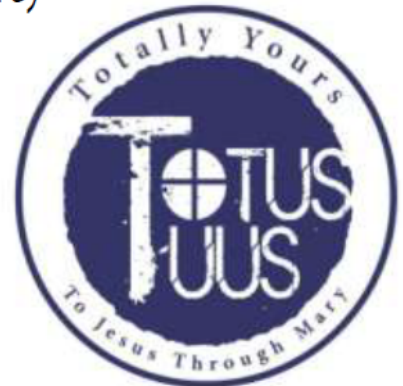

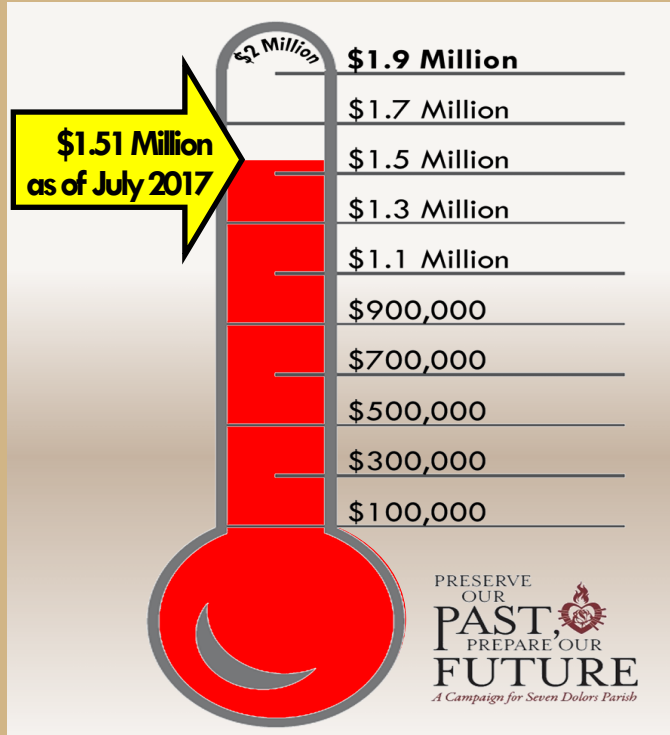
SAINTS OF JULY

We have several “big” saints that we remember this month: St. Junipero Serra, (July 1) who was a Spanish Franciscan friar, best known for founding the string of twenty-one missions that stretch from San Diego to Sonoma, California. The chapel at San Juan Capistrano is believed to be the oldest standing building in California, and the only one left where Serra is known to have celebrated the Liturgy. Next is St. Thomas, also called “Didymus” or “the Twin” was one of the Twelve Apostles. (July 3) He is remembered for doubting the Resurrection of Christ. Thomas is the only Apostle who went outside the borders of the Roman Empire to Evangelize. He is the patron of architects and builders and of India. St. Maria Goretti (July 6) is one of the youngest to be canonized. She died of stab wounds after she resisted an attacker. She is the patron of rape victims. Another woman saint is St. Kateri Tekakwitha (July 14) who was called the “Lily of the Mohawks.” She is the first Native American to have been beatified and was canonized in 2012. She converted to Christianity after a few encounters with Jesuit missionaries. She attended daily Mass, fasted twice a week, taught children and cared for the sick. Next is St. Bonaventure (July 15), a scholastic theologian and philosopher, who studied at Paris with his contemporary, Thomas Aquinas. He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1588 by Pope Sixtus V, and is called the “seraphic Doctor” because his love of God is so evident, even in his philosophical writings. The Memorial of St. Mary Magdalene is celebrated July 22. St. Mary is one of the most misunderstood women of the Bible. She was conflated with several other figures by medieval commentators, including Mary of Bethany (sister of Martha and Lazarus) and the sinful woman who washes Jesus’s feet with her hair. The confusion about who she is still exists. What we do know about Mary Magdalene is that Jesus healed her and that she was at the foot of the cross and was the first witness of his Resurrection. The Feast of St. James is celebrated July 25. He is the brother of the Apostle John, one of the “sons of thunder” who were privileged witnesses of some of Jesus greatest signs. James was the first Apostle to suffer martyrdom, slain by Herod’s orders. Many centuries later, his remains were discovered and a great cathedral was built over the spot where they were found – Santiago de Compostela in Spain. On July 26, we remember the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary – St. Joachim and Anne. St. Anne is the patroness of childless women, expectant mothers, and women in labor. July 29 is the memorial of St. Martha, sister of Lazarus. She appears to be a practical-minded woman. She is shown in art bearing the tools of a housekeeper – keys or a broom, and is the patron saint of domestic servants, homemakers, cooks, and single laywomen. And last, but not least, July 31 is the memorial of St. Ignatius of Loyola – the founder and first Father General of the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits and the author of the Spiritual Exercises. While recovering from a severe wound while serving in the army. While he recovered, he read about the life of Christ and the lives of the saints and decided to emulate them. After making a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, he enrolled at the University of Paris and he gathered six companions who would become the first Jesuits.

RCIA

If you are reading this right now, YOU are a Disciple! You also are also responsible by means of your baptism, to be involved in living the Gospel. In Christian Initiation - namely RCIA - the parish is a MAJOR part of this process. The purpose of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is to lead seekers on the way of faith and conversion. It is important that the parish as a whole serve as a guide to the seekers because the parish is our best example of the way of faith and conversion. So, what we are asking parishioners to do is to be a shining, clear example of a people of faith and a community of conversion. Be welcoming! Come downstairs after the 10 o'clock Mass and join in the conversations with the seekers. The sessions that are held in the meeting room downstairs is open to anyone wanting to share their faith journey! In reality, there is no RCIA community. The seekers are not joining the RCIA. They are joining Christ. And the place they find Christ is within the Body of Christ-the body of believers that we call "parish." That is the only community that can initiate the seekers into the way of faith and conversion. Candidates and Catechumens want to be Catholic - just like us!!! Come join us!

From the Executive Director of Shepherd's Crossing

In his book, *Chaos*, James Bleick defines the Butterfly Effect this way: "Tiny differences in input [can] quickly become overwhelming differences in output." A butterfly's air movement can create a weather pattern in the future. It is true in science and it is true in life. Small changes and small choices can become magnified over time and have major consequences. Too often many of our clients forget to connect the dots between choices and consequences and that every choice has a domino effect that can alter their future. Such as during the cold winter months when the Cold Weather Rule allows them to not pay their utility bills. [until later] But then when it gets warm three to five months' worth of utilities are due. It is difficult for Shepherd's Crossing to find \$1000 to keep their power or gas on. That is why we have initiated partnerships with three different financial planning programs to help our clients with their monthly spending habits and to encourage them to put money aside each month for large expenses. Like those high winter and summer utility bills or other expenses like unplanned auto repairs or yearly car tags and taxes. Shepherd's Crossing's motto is "We provide a **hand up** not a **hand out**."

Statistics for 2016: Shepherd's Crossing served 1082 families which included 1482 adults and 973 children. These households received \$287,000 in assistance. 54% of these families were single parent households with 457 children. They also assisted 114 households with disabled family members. These households received over \$90,000 in assistance with included 151 adults and 64 children. This is one of the most deserving classifications of clients which they serve. Many of these households have incomes less than \$1000 per month.

Seven Dolors has been involved with Shepherd's Crossing since its inception. Thank you to all who donate to the Charity Fund which helps those in need.

5 Ways to Get More Out of Mass

When we graduate, our diploma says we have “rights and responsibilities” that our degree confers on us. So too does our baptism. In Mass, you have the right to understand what you are doing and to participate as fully as possible. Your full participation in the Mass is actually the best way you learn how to be Christian! The Church says it this way: “This full and active participation by all the people is the aim to be considered before all else; for it is primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit.” (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, 11) It is our responsibility to come to Mass prepared and ready to participate in it as best you can. Here are five ways to help you do just that.

1) Pray daily Praying is a skill you have to practice. To participate as best we can at Sunday Mass, we each have to pray daily. Find some time during the week to read the upcoming Sunday's readings. You can find them at uscgb.org.

2) Bring more than yourself to Mass In your mind and heart, bring the names of those people who have asked you to pray for them; those who are hurting this week; those people and places in the news that are suffering. Bring your joys, things you are grateful for this week; and your sorrow, your burdens, regrets, and worries this week. Bring your voice. If you think you have an awful voice, make it part of your sacrifice to give back to God what God gave you! If you can't bring yourself to do even that, then at least pick up the songbook and pretend to sing. Part of your responsibility is to encourage others to take their responsibility seriously too. Others feel more comfortable signing if the people around them are singing or at least look like they're singing.

3) Practice silence and stillness at Mass Try to come to Mass early so you have a few moments of silence before the Mass begins. Now, the room itself doesn't have to be silent for you to find some quiet space in yourself to focus on what you're about to do. You only need to quiet yourself. Remember, Jesus was able to fall asleep in the boat even while a storm raged all around him...so be like Jesus if your neighbors aren't as quiet as you'd like them to be. Say a special prayer for them. During Mass, try to practice some silence and stillness at three appointed times: * As the Act of Penitence at the beginning of Mass and after each invitation to pray (“Let us pray”). * After the readings and the homily; in these silences we meditate on what we've heard; and * After everyone has shared in Communion; here we each give thanks and praise to God in our hearts. If you can, accompany your silence with some stillness as well. Closing your eyes, slowing your breathing, and quieting your body will help you to focus your mind and heart.

4) Actively seek Christ at Mass Christ is present at Mass in several ways: most especially in the Eucharist; and in the person of the priest; and perhaps most essentially in the people when we gather to sing and pray. Christ is in the person next to you, even the ones who are talking in church. See Christ as you share the Sign of Peace. See Christ in our wonderful stained glass windows. Then listen for Christ in the Scriptures and homily, but also in the songs and prayers, in the silence and in the chatter of toddlers, in the voices of those who sing and pray with you. Finally seek Christ in what you do. When you make the sign of the cross, do it slowly, intentionally. When you genuflect or bow, stand, sit or kneel, do so reverently and actively, that is, attend to what you're doing and place your focus on what's happening in the Mass at the moment.

5) Take more than yourself and the bulletin home As you leave the church, think of one thing that you want to remember from Mass this week. Maybe it's a word or a song you heard, or a person or a thing at church you saw. Or a feeling you had at a particular moment at Mass. Take this memory with you, and pray with it during the week. Ask yourself what might God be asking you to do or learn this week because of this memory he has given you.

Help us to imitate your love for the human family by recognizing that we are all connected – to our brothers and sisters around the world, to those in poverty impacted by environmental devastation and to future generations. Holy Spirit, giver of wisdom and love, You breathe life in us and guide us. Help us to live according to your vision, stirring to action the hearts of all – individuals and families, communities of faith, and civil and political leaders. Triune God, help us to hear the cry of those in poverty, and the cry of the earth, so that we may together care for our common home. Amen.



Pope Francis states in *Laudato Si*: The notion of the common good also extends to future generations. The global economic crises have made painfully obvious the detrimental effects of disregarding our common destiny, which cannot exclude those who come after us. We can no longer speak of sustainable development apart from intergenerational solidarity.

Once we start to think about the kind of world we are leaving to future generations, we look at things differently; we realize that the world is a gift which we have freely received and must share with others. Since the world has been given to us, we can no longer view reality in a purely utilitarian way, in which efficiency and productivity are entirely geared to our individual benefit. Intergenerational solidarity is not optional, but rather a basic question of justice, since the world we have received also belongs to those who will follow us. (159)

Whether you're ready to cut back on your showers or replace your lawn with water-wise plants, there are lots of big and small ways that you can conserve water around the home. Don't worry if you can't do everything on this list. Just pick a few things to start with, and do more as you can. Even a few small changes can add up to hundreds of gallons in water savings each year! Here are 20 water-saving tips to get you going...

- 1. Shower Bucket** Instead of letting the water pour down the drain, stick a bucket under the faucet while you wait for your shower water to heat up. You can use the water for flushing the toilet or watering your plants.
- 2. Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth** Water comes out of the average faucet at 2.5 gallons per minute. Don't let all that water go down the drain while you brush! Turn off the faucet after you wet your brush, and leave it off until it's time to rinse.
- 3. Turn off the tap while washing your hands** Do you need the water to run while you're scrubbing your hands? Save a few gallons of water and turn the faucet off after you wet your hands until you need to rinse.
- 4. Limit flushing** This tip might not be for everyone, but the toilet is one of the most water-intensive fixtures in the house. Do you need to flush every time?
- 5. Fix your leaks** Whether you go DIY or hire a plumber, fixing leaky faucets can mean big water savings.
- 6. Re-use your pasta cooking liquid** Instead of dumping that water down the drain, try draining your pasta water into a large pot. Once it cools, you can use it to water your plants. Just make sure you wait, because if you dump that boiling water on your plants, you might harm them.
- 7. Head to the car wash** If you feel compelled to wash your car, take it to a car wash that recycles the water, rather than washing at home with the hose.
- 8. Cut your showers short** Older shower heads can use as much as 5 gallons of water per minute. Speed things up in the shower for some serious water savings.
- 9. Choose efficient fixtures** Aerating your faucets, investing in a low-flow toilet, choosing efficient shower heads, and opting for a Water Sense rated dishwasher and washing machine can add up to big water savings.
- 10. Shrink your lawn** Even better: lose the lawn completely. Instead, opt for a xeriscaped landscape that incorporates water wise ground cover, succulents, and other plants that thrive in drought conditions.

Water fact: The average American household uses 400 gallons of water per day!


