# EASTER TRADITION

Before the egg became closely entwined with the Christian Easter, it was honored during many rite-of-Spring festivals. The Romans, Gauls, Chinese, Egyptians and Persians all cherished the egg as a symbol of the universe, of the earth's rebirth at springtime. With the advent of Christianity the symbolism of the egg changed to represent, not nature's rebirth, but the rebirth of man. Christians embraced the egg symbol and likened it to the tomb from which Christ rose. Saint Augustine first described Christ's Resurrection from the dead as a chick bursting from an egg. This symbolism was enhanced in the Christian East's celebration of Easter. At the end of the Paschal Liturgy, the faithful exchange paschal greetings and the priest and the faithful present each other with red eggs. Wooden eggs are sometimes suspended from hanging lamps and chandeliers, and often the faithful decorate wooden eggs with icons and hang them from the vigil lights in their homes.



## THE FIRST EASTER EGG

According to tradition, Saint Mary Magdalene, who had patrician rank, gained an audience in Rome with the emperor after the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Christ. She denounced Pilate for his handling of Jesus' trial and then began to talk with Caesar about Jesus' resurrection. She picked up a hen's egg from the dinner table to illustrate her point about resurrection. Caesar was unmoved and replied that there was as much chance of a human being returning to life as there was for the egg to turn red. Immediately, the egg miraculously turned red in her hand! It is because of this tradition that Orthodox Christians exchange red eggs at Easter.

## OTHER CHRISTIAN TRADITIONS

Eastern Christian legends blended folklore and Christian beliefs and firmly attached the egg to the Easter celebration. A Polish legend tells of when Mary Magdalen went to the sepulchre to anoint the body of Jesus. She had with her a basket of eggs to serve as a repast. When she arrived at the sepulchre and uncovered the eggs, lo, the pure white shells had miraculously taken on a rainbow of colors. One legend concerns the Virgin Mary. It tells of the time the Blessed Virgin gave eggs to the soldiers at the cross. She entreated them to be less cruel and she wept. Her tears fell upon the eggs, spotting them with dots of brilliant color.

Decorating and coloring eggs for Easter was the custom in England during the Middle Ages. The household accounts of Edward I, for the year 1290, recorded an expenditure of eighteen pence for four hundred and fifty eggs to be gold-leafed and colored for Easter gifts.

Let's talk about Easter Sunday. The celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ continued into Easter Sunday morning. Easter Sunday marked the end of the Triduum and is the first day of the Easter Octave. The celebration of the Triduum concluded after Vespers and the Great Fifty days began. For forty days of fast yields to fifty days of feast. Easter is a great time of welcome. Do you know anyone who is just waiting to be asked to come to Mass again?

The evening began with Fr. Kerry Ninemire leading us in a prayer service that included Adoration and Benediction. After a delicious potluck dinner, 13 adorers received lapel pins to commemorate their combined 125 years praying one hour each week before the Blessed Sacrament.

Fr. Ryan McCandless, who was ordained in June of 2017 and is currently Parochial Vicar at St. Isidore's Catholic Student Center, was our guest speaker. Father discussed the role Adoration can play in our lives, our futures, and our call to holiness. Additionally, he shared that praying before the Real Presence in Adoration helped with his discernment for the priesthood. Fr. Ryan, who is also an artist, shared his original oil of a mother pelican feeding her young with her own flesh, an ancient symbol of our Lord Jesus feeding us with His body and blood in the Holy Eucharist.

# Earth Day

Earth Day is April 22. WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT PLASTIC POLLUTION?

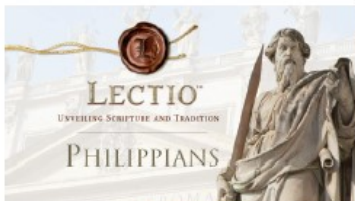
If you have recently walked down city streets, in the country side, or even along a beach on a remote island, you might notice something in common: plastics. Plastics are some of the most commonly littered items in the world and they are drowning our planet. Is this a real problem, you might ask? Plastics have come to clutter almost every landscape, but they are so useful and have made our lives much easier. We can carry our purchases from the store, stay dry in the rain, store things easily and securely, and preserve perishable food. Plastics are present in furniture, construction materials, cars, appliances, electronics and countless other things. Plastics are everywhere, even in our homes. Just look closely in your refrigerator! After decades of producing trillions of oil-based plastic items, the negative consequences are startling. Plastic pollution is now recognized as a hazard to public health and the human body. Chemicals leached from some plastics used in food/beverage storage are harmful to human health. Correlations have been shown between levels of some of these chemicals, and an increased risk of problems such as chromosomal and reproductive system abnormalities, impaired brain and neurological functions, cancer, cardiovascular system damage, adult-onset diabetes, early puberty, obesity and resistance to chemotherapy. Many plastics contain phthalates (DEHP) and the chemical BPA. If food or drink is stored in these plastics, they can be contaminated with these chemicals. If food is heated inside these containers in the microwave or if the plastic is ingested as in the case of a small child, these chemicals make their way into our food and into our bodies. Both chemicals are potentially harmful to human hormones, reproductive systems, and early childhood development.

## **Pilgrim Bread**

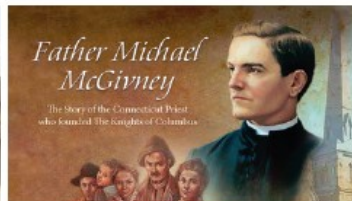

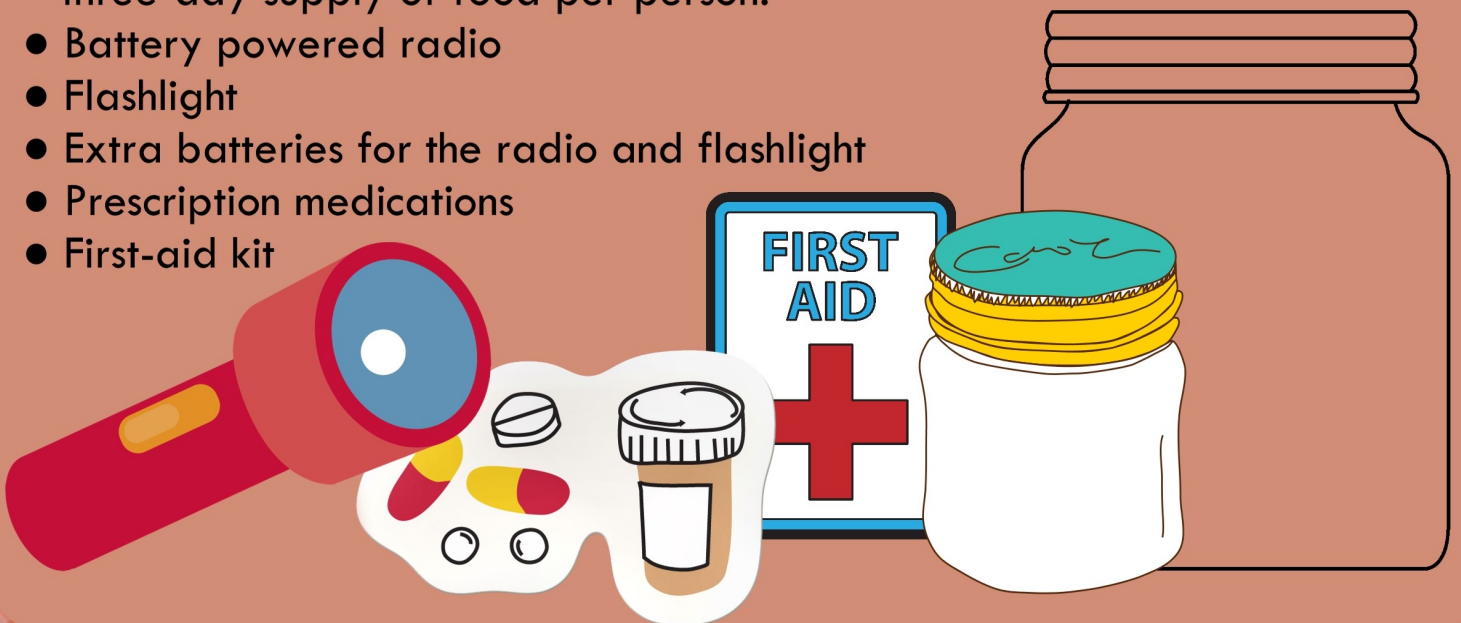

# DO YOU HAVE A PLAN?

## EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Fires, tornados, floods, oh my! With tornado season upon us, having a disaster plan for your family is important. In our area, in the last 30 years, families have experienced fires, tornados, and floods. Tornados are a given for this part of the country but the '93 flood which created destruction and forced evacuations is not. So, being prepared for the usual as well as the unusual natural disaster is important. Fires are always a consideration when planning for emergency situations. Are your important documents safe from fire and flood, ready to carry out of the house quickly, if necessary? Is your family ready to react to each of these situations without panic, knowing which responsibility each person has, safe places to go (either in the home or outside of the home) and how to contact each other in case of separation? Planning and practice for the most likely emergency insures that all members of the family stay safe and act in a calm and purposeful manner. Following are some suggestions of items to keep in your home, and in your car in case you have to evacuate.

- Water and canned or dried food – families should set aside one gallon of water per person per day, to last three days, and a three-day supply of food per person.
- Battery powered radio
- Flashlight
- Extra batteries for the radio and flashlight
- Prescription medications
- First-aid kit

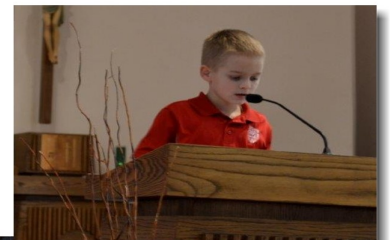

Here is February's break down:

Utilities: \$10, 554 to 55 households; Prescriptions: \$1352 to 13 households; \$77 for Birth Certificates; Rent: \$9,644 to 39 households. The average dollar amount spent per family is \$196.61. It will soon be time that Westar and Kansas Gas remove the "winter rules" for shutting off power and gas. Their financial needs will even be greater. Fairy Godmother applications and Guardian Applications – 10. The 20 volunteers gave over 200 hours of their time.
