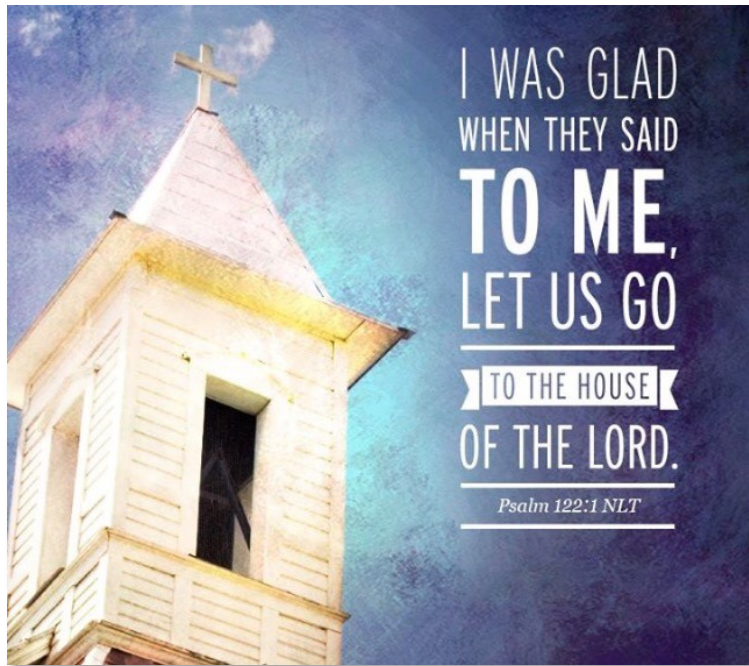

SUNDAY AND GOING TO CHURCH: A Reflection from Fr. Merlin Kieffer

In the Pentecost Scripture from Acts (2:1-11) we learned that fire which appeared along with a noise “like a strong driving wind” was a manifestation of the Holy Spirit – whose coming united a small band of Jesus’ disciples into a Church!

Emile Durkeim, writing early in the 20th century in his book, *The Elementary Forms of Religious Life*, wrote that “The idea of religion is inseparable from the idea of a Church; it conveys the notion that religion must be an eminently collective thing.”

A Lutheran minister, writing about teaching an introductory religion class at Carthage College in the year 2,000, reflected on the often-

asked question of his students, even then, “Do you have to go to church to be a good person.”

He observed that many of them want the answer to be “No” in order to justify their conduct. They wanted to distinguish between being “religious” and being “spiritual.” He says that this reveals a growing sense that personal freedom is valued more than being a member of institutional religion, which they viewed as “oppressive.”

He asks in response: “Doesn’t social or community peace end up being essential to one’s inner peace? That’s what’s at stake in going to church: peace. We can’t have it without finding how to live with one another in love.”

Pentecost gives us opportunity to rediscover a fire that truly unites: the fire of the Holy Spirit that unites us in Christ. Of course, Mass is more meaningful, if we attend with a sense of unity! The whole purpose of the Eucharist is to unite us to one another in and through the person of Jesus Christ. The experience of the Eucharist is what makes us Catholic.

That is why we cannot be a good Catholic if we do not attend Sunday Mass. Not attending Mass is to step away from the fire that unites us. It is to step away from the very purpose of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ – which unites and reconciles us with the Father. Separated from the community of faith we cannot participate in the Body of Christ.

Pentecost is the birth of the Church because it is the birth of unity within a very special community. The “tongues of fire” are an allusion to and a symbol of the Torah, that is, the old Law of Moses, which united the children of Israel – the People of God.

The new tongues of flame tell us of the New Law of Christ, the observance of which unites us today. God breathed into the nostrils of the man giving him life. In the Pentecostal wind, God’s breath is experienced again as new life for humanity. Finally, we learn that out of many tongues, there came understanding at the Pentecost event.

In the story of Babel, the unity of humanity was taken away by God, we were told, because of humanity’s hubris, or pride! Humans began to believe they did not need God and suffered because of disunity. At Pentecost, God made a return of human understanding possible and thus unity is also possible once more.

The Church is essential to our unity, both spiritual and social. Just as the Spirit came only when the disciples were gathered together in prayer, it is in the Church gathered in prayer that the fire of the Holy Spirit especially lives. Christ’s life was in invitation to live in the light, warmth, and protection of this fire – this Spirit.

Stewardship Spotlight: Trinity Price

Trinity Price is the daughter of Andy and Deb Price. Trinity has been an altar server for 6 years and plays violin with the youth and adult choirs. She is also an active member of the Seven Dolors CYO. Recently, she was elected to serve on the Diocesan Youth Council (DYC) for the Salina Diocese. Trinity says "In DYC, I'll meet with other youth from around the diocese once a month and Sister Barbara Ellen (Diocesan Office of Religious Education) to talk about the ideas we have and how to reach the youth better. This year, I also applied and was accepted for the Franciscan Lead program in St. Paul, MN. During Franciscan LEAD, I'll go to St. Paul, MN, and meet with other youth from around the US. We will learn more about our faith and how to evangelize and at the end, we will get to help lead some events at the Steubenville conference. I have no other way to describe how I feel except for blessed."

Franciscan LEAD is a five-day, Christ-centered, sacrament-soaked, prayer fueled immersion in Catholic teachings on leadership, evangelization, and discipleship inspired by the life and witness of St. Francis of Assisi. Their leadership philosophy is based on the foundation that youth leadership flows from a personal relationship with Christ. Therefore, they first give teens the tools to grow closer in their relationship with Jesus and then give them the essentials for servant leadership and evangelization.

Congratulations to Trinity as she continues on her faith journey as a Catholic youth! Please keep her in your prayers as she begins a new chapter in the Church.

June: The Month of the Sacred Heart

The Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is celebrated on the Friday after the feast of Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi Sunday). One of the most beloved aspects of our Catholic tradition is our devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In honoring the Sacred Heart, we are honoring the compassion and love of Christ: Jesus' human heart, moved with pity for his flock, Jesus' divine heart, pierced for the sins of God's people. The devotion we know today began in France in the seventeenth century. There are many devotions associated with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, especially the litany of the Sacred Heart, and the devotion of the nine first Fridays, in which people attend Mass on the first Friday of each month, celebrating the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, in keeping with the words of Christ

to St. Margaret Mary, when he promised grace, peace, and consolation to those who would honor him in this way. On the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we give thanks to God for the infinite love of Christ, represented by the image of his heart on fire with love. Through our prayer, we also seek to make reparation for the ways that love has been reflected by human beings. This is why in the familiar image, Christ's heart is pierced and surrounded with thorns.

HISTORY OF RCIA

- The catechumenate as we know it began to develop between 100 and 200 AD.
- The fully-structured process emerged between the third and fifth centuries. By the third century, the initiation process had become a three-year, highly-structured formation.
- In 315, following Emperor Constantine conversion to Christianity, large numbers of people began converting. The quality of catechesis and formation began to suffer.
- In the late 5th century, the practice of initiation began to be focused on infants. Confirmation and Eucharist began to be separated from baptism.
- By the 12th century, the practice of infant baptism was normative. The catechumenate had died out, but elements of it could still be seen in the formation of monks and nuns.
- By the 16th century, entire villages and communities were being baptized en-mass with little or no formation.
- By the 20th century, the catechumenate was a distant memory. However, some French missionaries began to revive elements of the ancient formation process to counteract the negative effects of mass baptisms and elevate the quality of lived-discipleship.
- At the Second Vatican Council, bishops called for a restoration of the catechumenate.
- 1966 – the provisional ritual for catechumenate was distributed
- 1972 – the normative rite was promulgated in Latin (*Ordo initiationis christianae adultorum*)
- 1974 – a provisional English translation was issued (*Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults*)
- 1986 – the U.S. Bishops' Conference approved the present edition of the RCIA.
- 1988 – U.S Bishops made the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults mandatory.

RCIA AT SEVEN DOLORS

Our parish has just completed it's first year implementing the "new" process for RCIA. This paradigm has been encouraged for RCIA communities nationwide through conferences, seminars and webinars for the past several years. Rosie Rundell, the RCIA Director for our parish, has attended many conferences given by Nick Wagner and Diana Macalintal – TeamRCIA, Jerry Galipeau and several webinars. Last summer, she and Fr. Frank Coady attended the first National Gathering on Christian Initiation – a conference for Catechumenal Ministers and Pastoral Leaders. This past year has been one of growing and changing on how we "do" RCIA. Changing the meeting times to Sunday reinforces that the liturgy is one of the greatest teaching resources for those interested in the Catholic faith. The way we form our catechumens and candidates DOES matter. It reveals our priorities. The authorities for RCIA reiterate that the process is NOT class! It's more of an apprenticeship. The first Christians did not have a classroom setting when they were formed to be Christians! We teach by our actions as a Catholic faith community. This is why YOU, our parish community, are SO important in this process. This is why each week, you are invited to join the catechumens and candidates after the 10am Mass. Our parish IS the Curriculum! We form disciples in Word, Community, Worship, and Witness.

2018 Catholic Community Annual Appeal: Frequently Asked Questions

Why do we have an annual appeal for the Catholic Diocese of Salina?

Our diocese is in a distinct position to share Christ with others through numerous ministries and programs offered throughout the diocese. These depend on funding. The **2018 Catholic Community Annual Appeal (CCAA)** provides an opportunity for Catholics across northcentral and northwest Kansas to follow the teachings of Peter – **“As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another.”** With your gift, you join in partnership with the diocese to provide the services that enhance and sustain the Catholic life in your local parishes.

Why is it important to support not only my parish, but also the diocese through CCAA?

A broader understanding of being Catholic extends beyond our parish community. Each year CCAA funds the ongoing ministries of the Catholic Church in northcentral and northwest Kansas. This includes Seminarian and clergy education, as well as education for youth and adults. These are programs and services available to many more Catholics than a single parish could offer on its own. There are numerous ways that the CCAA impacts your parish – a list of examples follows.

Catholic teachings have suggested tithing 10% of your income – 5% to your parish, 4% to other charities, and 1% to the larger Church community. The annual appeal provides an opportunity for you to evaluate your charitable giving and to share your gifts with the diocese.

How and when can I give?

Giving a CCAA gift is easy! Our pledge cards have the option to give once, quarterly or monthly over 10 months, starting in March and ending in December 2018. You can also give online at <https://salinadio.solutiosoftware.com/development/online-giving>. Pledging over time allows you to spread your gift over several months, thus making a larger gift more comfortable. All gifts and pledges should be paid by December 31, 2018. How much should I give?

Charitable giving is a reflection of God’s gifts to us. Giving back to God should require a sacrifice that reflects God’s generosity to us as individuals. Therefore, your gift is a personal decision between you and God. It should be made after prayer and reflection. Give as much as your personal circumstances will allow. As a guide for your reflection, below is a chart illustrating the 10-month gift opportunity and the daily sacrifice required for selected gift levels. Any gift is greatly appreciated!


