The Month of All Saints & All Souls

On November 1, the Church honors all the saints - those who have finished the race and now rejoice in God's presence. We honor the towering figures like Saints Peter, Paul, Augustine, Francis, and Therese of the Child Jesus and we welcome our new saints: St. Oscar Romero and St. Pope Paul VI, St. Vincent Romano, St. Francesco Spinelli, St. Nunzio Sulprizio, St. Nazaria Ignacia March Mesa, and St. Maria Katharina Kasper. We also honor the humble saints as well, those whose names are known to few or to none: the grandparents and ancestors, the friends, and teachers who lived their faith to the full and inspired faith in others. This is a day to celebrate them all. An observance in honor of all the saints has been celebrated on Nov. 1 since at least the seventh century, and it originated even earlier, with a feast in honor of all martyrs in the year 359. "Why should our praise and glorification, or even the celebration of this feastday mean anything to the saints?" asked Saint Bernard of Clairvaux in a homily on All Saints' Day. "Clearly, if we venerate their memory, it serves us, not them. But I tell you, when I think of them, I feel myself inflamed with a tremendous yearning. Calling the saints to mind inspires, or rather arouses in us, above all else, a longing to enjoy their company. . . We long to share in the citizenship of heaven to swell with the spirits of the blessed. . . In short, we long to be united in happiness with all the saints" (Office of Readings, Volume IV, p.1526) All holy women and men, saints of God, pray for us!

November 2 is the church's "memorial day." This is the day for Catholics to visit the graves of their loved ones who have gone before them. *Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and let perpetual grace shine upon them. May they and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.*

Dia de los Muertos



Dia de los Muertos—the Day of the Dead—is a holiday celebrated on November 1. Although marked throughout Latin America, Dia de los Muertos is most strongly associated with Mexico, where the tradition originated.

Dia de los Muertos honors the dead with festivals and lively celebrations, a typically Latin American custom that combines indigenous Aztec ritual with Catholicism, brought to the region by Spanish conquistadores. (Dia de los Muertos is celebrated on All Saints Day and All Souls Day, minor holidays in the Catholic calendar.)

Assured that the dead would be insulted by mourning or sadness, Dia de los Muertos celebrates the lives of the deceased with food, drink, parties, and activities the dead enjoyed in life. Dia de los Muertos recognizes death as a natural part of the human experience, a continuum with birth, childhood, and growing up to become a contributing member of the community. On Dia de los Muertos, the dead are also a part of the community, awakened from their eternal sleep to share celebrations with their loved ones.

The most familiar symbol of Dia de los Muertos may be the calacas and calaveras (skeletons and skulls), which appear everywhere during the holiday: in candied sweets, as parade masks, as dolls. These symbols are almost always portrayed as enjoying life, often in fancy clothes and entertaining situations.

The Catholic Baptismal Font

Catholic baptisteries have traditionally been associated with the front doors of the church. This is because baptism is the initial sacrament, out of which all the Church's activity flows. Through baptism into Christ Jesus, Christians enter into the family of God (the Church) and into the Kingdom of God. The font and the doors of the physical church building symbolize this entrance that is spiritual but no less real. The sacrament of the Eucharist, the one most frequently celebrated in Catholic churches, is actually the ongoing celebration of that initiation experience Christians had in baptism and confirmation. The signing with baptismal water as one enters, the penitential rite, and the Creed are all baptismal, thus giving a context for the great prayer and thanksgiving and praise that follow. The Church's other sacramental rites all acknowledge the fact that they are extensions and fulfillments of the baptismal vocation. The marriage rite begins at the front doors, as does the funeral rite. Confirmation and ordination are both preceded by the renewal of baptismal promises and the Litany of Saints, which originated as the processional song for the newly baptized entering the church.

Modern liturgical directives for the design of new churches require that everyone enter through the same doors (i.e., through the same common gathering area) so that there will be greater socialization among the members of the assembly but also so that they will all be forced to encounter the one font. The Church wants Catholics to continually renew their baptism, not bless themselves with holy water.

Those same directives require that new fonts be designed where possible for immersion of adults. By immersion, the Catholic Church means that the initiates stand in water and have water poured over them. The Second Vatican Council called for a renewal of all the sacramental rites so that each might more fully express, through sacramental signs, the outpouring of divine grace that they celebrate. Ample amounts of water poured, and ample amounts of oil applied symbolize more fully one's sharing in the death and resurrection of Christ.

Likewise, an ample amount of moving water in the baptismal font symbolizes more fully the infinite largesse of God's love than does a cupful of still water in a small bowl attached to the wall. While our baptismal font will not be moving water, it will be large enough to properly symbolize God's outpouring love.



Rite of Acceptance

On the first Sunday of Advent, December 2, our parish will celebrate the Rite of Acceptance for the RCIA Inquirers. This Rite is formally known as The (Combined) Celebration of the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens and the Rite of Welcoming Baptized but Previously Uncatechized Adults Who are Preparing for Confirmation and/or Eucharist or Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. The Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens (Rite of Acceptance) is the first of the “threshold rites” of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), and the first public ritual. In the Rite of Acceptance, a change of identity takes place: those previously known as Inquirers become catechumens – one who is not baptized. Those who have been baptized in a non-Catholic church, are now known as Candidates They are officially welcomed by the Church as disciples, members (albeit not yet full members) of the household of faith. They are literally marked with the cross of Christ as God’s own. Our responsibility as a parish is to travel this journey with them by showing them examples of what BEING a Catholic Christian is all about. As this Rite is being celebrated, reflect on how YOU have been marked with the Cross of Christ. What does this mean to YOU! Please keep our Candidates in prayer as they continue this journey. Finance Council: With the absence of a Finance Director, Pottberg, Gassman and Hoffman will be doing the general fund accounting and payroll for both the school and parish. If you have questions, call the office. MCS reported that enrollment is around 250 students. Remodeling is complete. The Annual Chicken dinner was a success as was the Annual Auction. **Building & Grounds:** The Luckey Building parking lot had a water issue that has been taken care of. The rental house is being painted. Clean up day will be November 3. **Parish Life:** The annual celebration of our feast day was held at the Sunset Zoo. Around 250 people attended. Next event is the annual Parish Birthday Dinner which is to be April 7, 2019. **Evangelization Commission:** The parish mission will be in October 2019. **Social Action:** The Advent giving tree will be placed in the church gathering space again. Richard Bryant presented information regarding the Disaster Preparedness conference to be held in Colorado Springs in December. This program is sponsored by Catholic Charities who is writing a grant that will pay four people to attend. The re-cycling is going well and they continue to encourage each home to begin recycling. Also, bread will be sold on January 6th with the donations going to the Ascension House in El Paso. Next Parish Pastoral Council will be November 19 at 7p.m. All parish pastoral council meetings are open.

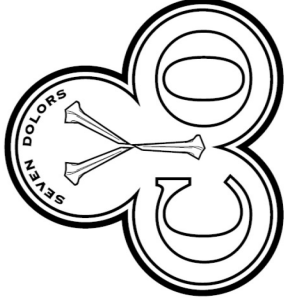
