The Psalms

Clergy and Religious are required to pray each day that which is called LITURGY OF THE HOURS or also known as THE BREVIARY. This consists of prayers at different times of the day, e.g., morning, noon, evening, night, etc. The breviary is mainly based on the psalms and all 150 psalms are prayed over a four-week cycle. One can pray this each day on line on either a site called UNIVERSALIS or LAUDETE (Laudate is more England English). I would recommend choosing just one of the times of the day. The psalms are the most traditional prayers we have. Jesus prayed them in the synagogues and the temple. They truly express deep feelings of thanks, adoration, frustration, seeking, etc. They would make a Good Lent!

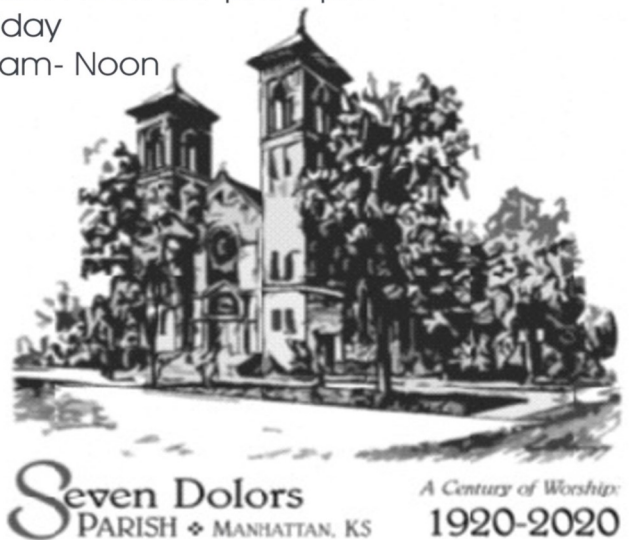

What is Lent?

Lent is the forty-day liturgical season of fasting, special prayer and almsgiving in preparation for Easter.

The name "Lent" is from the Middle English *Lenten* and Anglo-Saxon *Lenten*, meaning spring; its more primitive ecclesiastical name was the "forty days," *tessaracoste* in Greek. The number "forty" is first noted in the Canons of Nicaea (A.D. 325), likely in imitation of Jesus' fast in the desert before His public ministry (with Old Testament precedent in Moses and Elijah). By the fourth century, in most of the West, it referred to six days fast per week of six weeks (Sundays were excluded); in the seventh century the days from Ash Wednesday through the First Sunday were added to make the number forty.

What are you doing for Lent this year?

Ask Catholics what they're doing for Lent this year, and they'll probably tell you that they are giving up a favorite food, a favorite pastime or anything else they really love but isn't essential in their lives.

Giving up something for Lent fosters self-discipline and tempers our desires. It is a form of fasting. It is a form of penance. It promotes spiritual growth. If you're giving up something for Lent, that's great. But think also about the possibility of doing something positive to bolster your spiritual life and make the world a better place. Look for ways that you can increase your knowledge of your faith, strengthen your spiritual life or perform special acts of mercy and kindness at home, at work, in your parish or in your community.

Lenten Devotions

The practice of daily devotions stems from Lent's emphasis on deepening one's faith through study and prayer. Lent offers the opportunity to take up a "discipline" or "spiritual practice" for 40 days, not as a way of meriting God's favor but because disciplined practice increases our appreciation and understanding of the faith. For generations, parents would read devotions during Lent at suppertime as a way of passing on the faith to their children, and individuals would read devotions to grow and deepen in their faith. Some suggestions:

- Begin each morning with the prayer: "Lord, I offer you this day, and all that I think, and do, and say."
 - Attend Daily Mass as often as possible.
 - Pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary.
- Make the Stations of the Cross at home or in our Friday, 6:00 pm celebrations.
- Spend some time in quiet prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in our Adoration Chapel.
 - Abstain from meat for an extra day or two each week.
 - Listen to spiritual music or a spiritual speaker.
- Keep a Lenten journal with your spiritual insights, special intentions, people you want to pray for, hurts and disappointments that you want to offer up, and progress reports on your Lenten resolutions.

Days of Abstinence: No meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent. This applies to all Catholics 14 and older.

Days of Fast: Only one full meal is permitted on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday for Catholics between 18 and 59. Two smaller meals are permitted, but the small meals should not equal a second full meal. Drinking coffee, tea and water between meals is allowed. Snacks between meals are not allowed.

Lent in a Latino Culture

Holy Thursday: In many Latino parishes, in addition to the traditional foot washing, there is a blessing of a special bread called pan bendito ("blessed bread"), which is then passed out after the Mass that can be shared with those who are sick or otherwise unable to attend the liturgy. In addition, some parishes decorate the altar on which the Blessed Sacrament is placed with flowers and candles. The candles are blessed and taken home to be used in power outages or during storms to remind parishioners of Christ's presence.

Good Friday: A widespread practice among Latino Catholics is re-enacting the Via Crucis — Way of the Cross — on the streets, with a procession. In addition, there are often Siete Palabras meditations, or meditations on the last seven words of Jesus, often with solemn music and liturgical dancing. Another popular Good Friday devotion is called Pesame, which offers condolences to the Virgin Mary under her title of Our Lady of Sorrows for the sorrow she felt as she saw her son crucified. The service often includes a procession, Marian prayers and music.

10 tips for making Lent more meaningful

1. Slow Down - Set aside 10 minutes a day for silent prayer/meditation. It will revitalize your body and your spirit.
2. Read a good book - You could choose the life of a saint, a spiritual how-to, an inspirational book or one of the pope's new books.
3. Be kind - Go out of your way to do something nice for someone else every day.
4. Get involved - Attend a Lenten lecture or spiritual program.
5. Volunteer at your parish - Whether it's the parish fish fry, cleaning the church or helping with the food drive, it will give you a chance to help others.
6. Reach out - Invite an inactive Catholic to come with you to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday.
7. Pray - Especially for people you don't like and for people who don't like you.
8. Tune out - Turn off the television and spend quality time talking with family members or friends.
9. Clean out closets - Donate gently used items to the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

St. Joseph's Adoration Chapel

Eucharistic Adoration has been a great blessing to many people. The following testimonial comes from St. Joseph's Adoration Chapel adorer, Taylor McAnerney.

"My first encounters with adoration took place before I really understood what adoration was or whose presence was in that chapel. When my husband and I started dating he would pick me up for a date, but first, he would take me into the chapel even if it was just for 10 minutes. Those moments were an opportunity for me to learn and read about the Catholic faith that I knew very little about. These days I continue to learn about my faith while in adoration but it is so much more than simply an educational experience.

I am blessed to have an hour each week without interruptions to remind me of the importance of re-centering my life around Christ. Life gets crazy and it's easy to slack in your faith and get sucked into the stresses of work, classes, and being a wife and a mother. However, in that chapel I plainly see all that I have to be thankful of God for. All the negatives that I can and sometimes do choose to focus on are easier to put in perspective when I am focused on Christ.

During adoration I contemplate and examine how I have grown or failed to grow in holiness that week. It is not difficult to fall short of the piety and virtuousness we are called to. However, because that chapel is a place of hope and peace I am given comfort knowing that no matter how we fail Him, Jesus will always love us and believes we can grow in holiness.

Walking into that chapel envelops my senses with the presence of Jesus. The silence is filled with the messages He wishes me to receive into my heart. I am overcome by the fragrance of candles and the vision of the Body of Christ on that altar. No matter how I'm feeling going into that chapel, I enter knowing there is no better place I could be."

The St. Joseph's Adoration Chapel at 8th and Pierre is open 24/7 although the front doors are locked from 9pm – 7am. You are encouraged to visit primarily between 7am – 9pm. Eucharistic Adoration is one of the greatest devotionals for transforming your heart to be more like Jesus.

Meet Graciela Berumen! She and her sons have been members of Seven Dolors since 2012, moving to Manhattan and not knowing anyone but finding Seven Dolors to be a supportive and welcoming community.

She lives her stewardship, at times reluctantly, but always full of faith that God knows what is best for her family. She says this because “many times we forget that God calls all of us even when we don’t think we have the time, talent or treasure to answer God’s call or to go where God is leading us. I believe that there is sacrifice in stewardship and that the important thing is that we trust that God will always give



us what we need to serve. As a single mother with a full time job, pursuing a doctorate and blessed with two active boys, finding time can be challenging. This is why it is important for me to set a good example of making time for what is important and finding ways to participate and serve our parish.” She considers herself so very lucky in our parish because there are many opportunities to serve: Prayer Shawl, Adoration Chapel, Budget Shop, RE, Choir, etc. Her favorite place to find discernment about how to give back to God is in the Adoration Chapel. After that she would suggest people reach out to different organizations and groups in our parish and volunteer. She knows you will find a smiling face and helping hand in all of them.

Currently they participate as a family in the choir at the Spanish Mass. This summer they will be traveling to Eldoret, Kenya to volunteer at a school for girls and a camp for runaway boys. The organization that is sponsoring this opportunity is called Every Girl is Important (everygirlisimportant.com). This project is run by Sister Veronica Rop, PhD, Mother Superior of Lady of the Assumptions Sisters and Diane Rodriguez, PhD, Professor at Fordham University. They will be volunteering with them this summer and we look forward to them sharing their experience when they return.

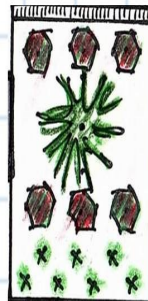

RCIA: Why are we seeing dismissal?

You may have noticed the formal dismissals have started with the second celebration of the Rite of Acceptance. The Dismissal Rite is actually for those who have not been Baptized and are uncatechized. The people who teach how to “do” RCIA have tried to closely return to the Catechumenate of the early church. There IS a distinction between people: those who are unbaptized and uncatechized; those who are baptized and uncatechized, those who are baptized and catechized. Sound confusing? Well, it isn’t really. What we try to do here at Seven Dolors is meet each individual where they are in their spiritual process. Have we learned from the past? Yes, which is why we are doing it “differently” now. We meet on Sunday. It is not a class. 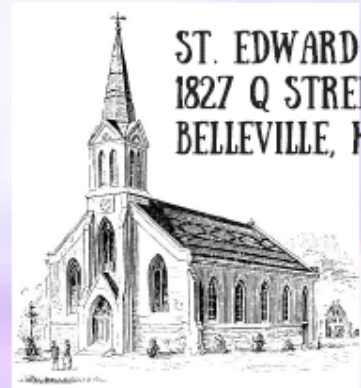
