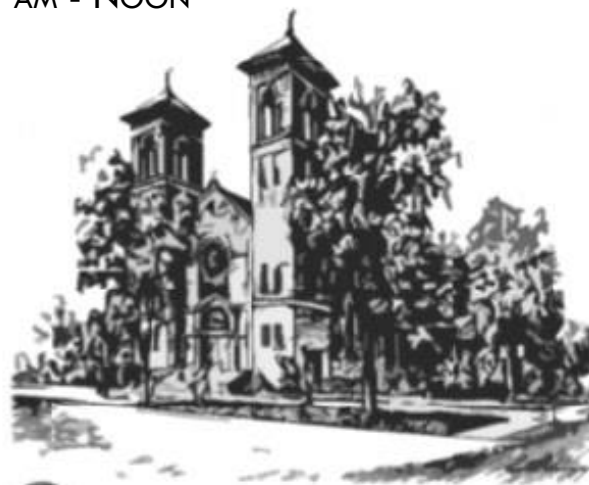

The Synod in the Salina Diocese

What is a synod? A synod is more than just the bishops reflecting on a particular topic and advising the pope. It is a process which involves all the faithful. It is a journey of discernment in which the people of God are called to pray and reflect upon the Holy Spirit's will for the Church.

How can I help? The first phase of the two-year synod called by Pope Francis is happening in local dioceses throughout the world. The goal of the synod is to become a more "listening" Church. A listening session will be held in Manhattan, at St. Thomas More Utopia Room, March 20, at 6:30pm. Anyone is invited to participate.



Liturgical Labels : Bells at Mass

What are bells used for? They are used for getting your attention. We have bells in our bell tower to be rung at least 5 minutes before our weekend Masses. They signal that Mass is about to begin. Then, right at the beginning of Mass we have the three small bells pulled to signal to the congregation to stand up to sing and welcome the ministers of the liturgy with song. Bells are then rung during the Eucharistic prayer. Their ringing is still there to catch your attention. The first time the bell is rung is during the epiclesis (epə'klēsəs) Greek meaning to "summon over". This action is the priest placing both hands together, palms down, calling the Holy Spirit over the bread and wine. As the priest says the prayer, one single ring signals to the congregation that the action is important enough for us to attend to. Next, the bells are rung after the institution narratives are said, and the host and the chalice are shown in elevation. The use of three shorter rings for each elevation gives the congregation a chance to adore the Eucharist from their pews with a brief amount of attention and silence. The priest himself genuflects in adoration after each elevation (you are kneeling continually for this very purpose). Finally, there is one more ring which is used during the Mass. This is a ring that completes the Eucharistic Rite. This is the moment the priest consumes the precious blood from the Chalice. The short ring here notifies the congregants that the distribution of Holy Communion is about to take place. The cantors can take up song, the ministers can move toward the altar, because Christ is moving from the focus of the altar toward the congregation so to be consumed. Though it can be argued that bells are no longer needed for Mass, I believe that their use helps redirect the congregation in their personal prayer toward the altar.

Dear Parishioners,

Often, there is a temptation during Lent to "go big" with our penances, we always want to do more. This is noble, but as I said, it is a temptation, and to dive in headfirst to become a perfect penitent can heighten a spiritual pride. I'm always happy to tell people when they've crashed and burned in their practices that it is precisely there, in the crash and the burn, that Jesus wants to meet you. This is a moment of the cross. Our perfection depends more on God than on our grandiose idea of what we think that looks like. I leave you with a little insight from one of my favorite books on prayer called *The Commonsense Book of Catholic Prayer* by Hilda Graef. "In these things, it is essential and cannot be stressed sufficiently that the right balance should always be kept. The element of penance is very necessary in our lives. But on the other hand, we are spirits within a body; and if we have to earn our daily bread by the labor of our hands or brains, if we have to look after our household and our family, we have to guard against overstrain, for, if we break down, it will mean great difficulties for those dependent on us.... For penance is only a means, not an end in itself." I believe that this coincides well with what Jesus wants us to focus on this Lent. May your life, and true end, always be union with God.

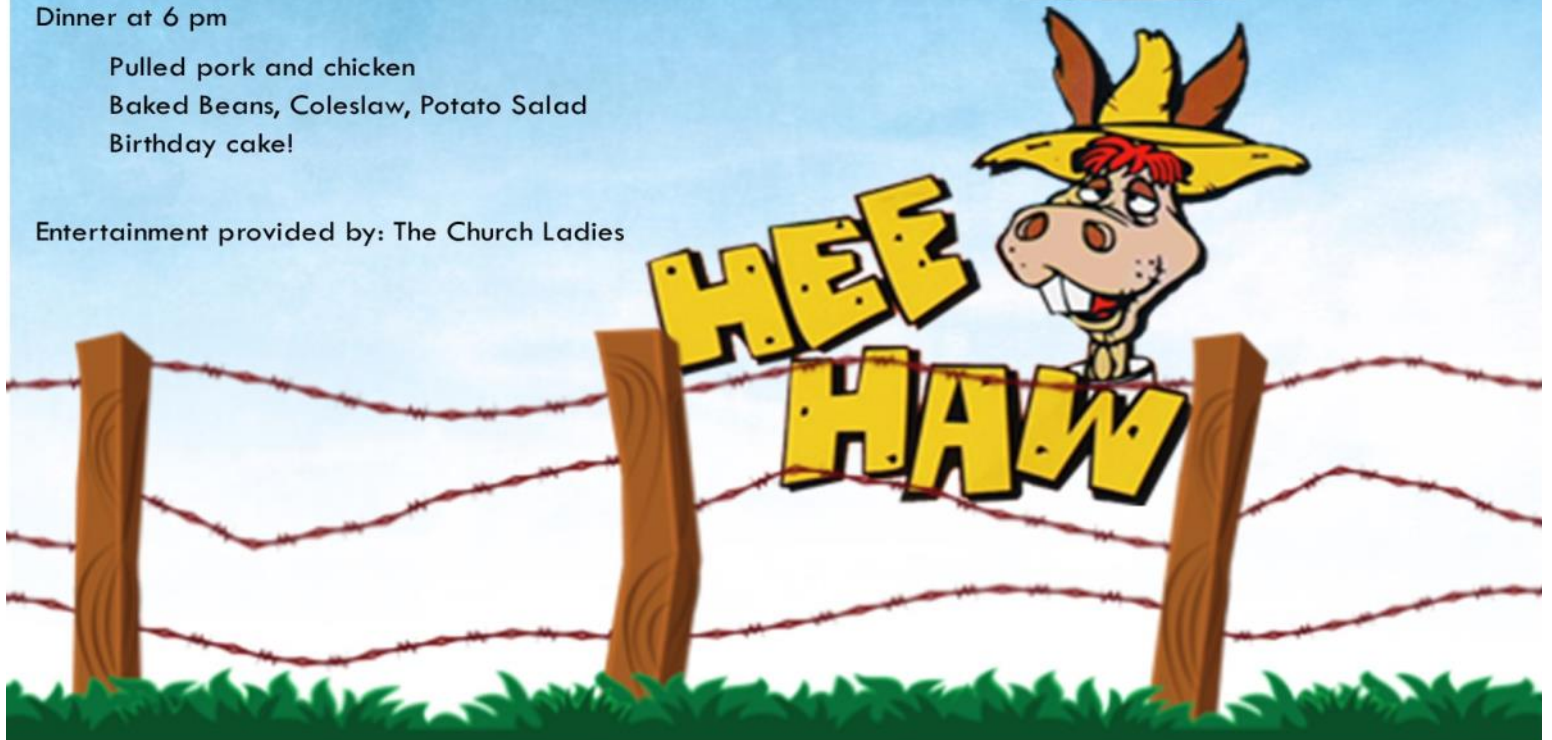

TAX PREPARATION

The Riley County K-State Research & Extension Office is operating the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Site again this year. The tax preparation is free to eligible taxpayers and all tax preparers are certified for tax preparation by the IRS.

Appointments will be available from January 26 through April 15 in the Collaboration Space at the Manhattan Public Library. To request an appointment for preparation of your Federal and State(s) returns, go to www.riley.ksu.edu And click on the Tax Appointment button. If you need assistance in setting up this appointment, email vitataxes@gmail.com or call 785-565-6426 and leave a message.

If you prefer to use our Drop-Off option of tax preparation, email vitataxes@gmail.com. If you do not have access to email, call 785-477-8877 for scheduling.

This program prepares IRS 1040 tax returns and corresponding state returns for qualifying low to moderate income taxpayers. We cannot prepare returns for International students. All taxpayers will be required to provide proof of identity as required by the IRS; this includes social security card or other social security documentation that includes the complete social security number or previous year tax return. Photo ID is also required.

It is imperative that you bring the following documents with you to your appointment, if applicable for your tax situation:

- Social security card for **every** person named on the tax returns
- Government issued photo ID for the taxpayer(s) named on the returns
- Direct deposit information; routing and account numbers, for refunds
- **You must know the amount of stimulus money received in 2021 and/or child tax credit money received;** not having this information accurate will significantly delay any refunds due to you.
- All other documents necessary for accurately preparing your tax return

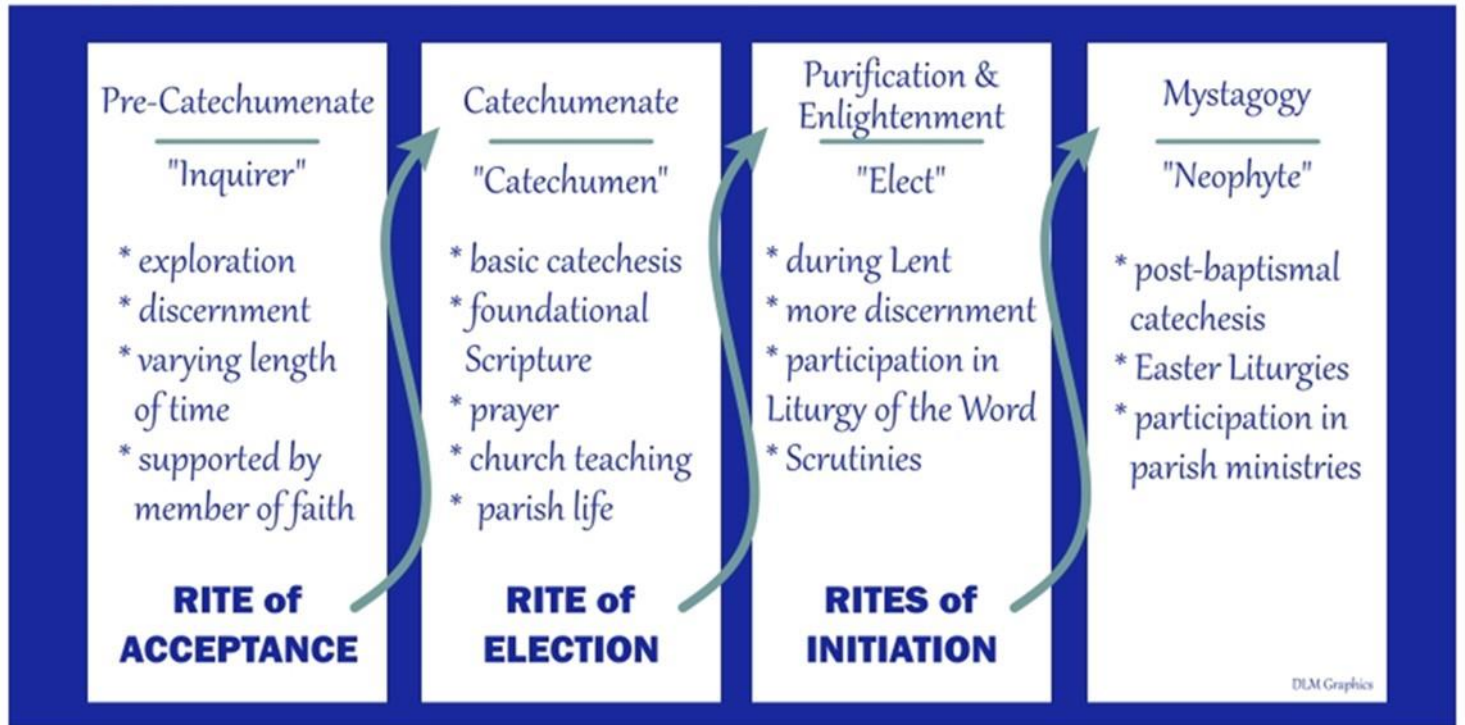

Rite of Christian Initiation

RCIA

The Process



Lent is the time when the RCIA process picks up speed. There are several Rites that the candidates (those who are baptized) and catechumens (those who are not baptized) will experience. Also, they will have a Lenten Retreat at St. Patrick's in Ogden to start the season off.

The first Rite they will experience is the Rite of Sending to Salina to present our group to Bishop Vincke. The Rite of Sending normally falls on the same day as the Rite of Election, it usually coincides with the first Sunday of Lent. Before the Rite of Sending, during the 10am Mass and in the presence of the RCIA Church, the catechumens and candidates inscribe their names in the Book of Elect as a pledge of fidelity. At the Rite of Sending, the godparents will testify and the catechumens will affirm of their intention to join the Church. The Church then makes its "election" of these catechumens to receive the Sacraments of Initiation, and sends them off to see Bishop Vincke.

At the Rite of Election, in the presence of our Bishop, the godparents will further testify the catechumens' intention to join the Church and the catechumens will affirm their decision. The RCIA Director then presents the Book of Elect followed by the catechumens and candidates to the Bishop for blessings.

Now the catechumens are called "the Elect" or "the illuminandi" meaning "those who will be enlightened". They now begin a Period of Purification and Enlightenment. This is the final, intense preparation for the reception of the Sacraments of Initiation. Over the next five Sundays of Lent, the elects will be presented with three scrutinies, the presentations of the Creed and Lord's Prayer will also take place. This period concludes with the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation – Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at Easter Vigil.

The RCIA is a spiritually moving process beneficial to the whole parish community. As we draw closer to the celebration of Easter, let us pray for these elects who will be entering our holy Catholic Church this Easter.

The SCRUTINIES

These very special rites are celebrated on the middle three Sundays of Lent, at liturgies where the Elect are present. The Elect are those in our midst who are preparing for Baptism. Part of their journey to the font is that they have been received among us at the Rite of Acceptance, and they have been enrolled in the Book of the Elect at the Rite of Election. Even if these rites are not celebrated at the liturgy we attend, it can be wonderful to reflect upon the journey these Elect are making during Lent, as an inspiration and source of renewal for us in our journey. These are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us, but they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We really need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers. We need to examine (scrutinize): • how we are • the areas of our lives where we are tempted • serious sin - what we do and what we fail to do

The initiation rites of the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent don't have the most comforting of names. On these days we engage the Elect in rites and prayers called scrutinies and exorcisms. The first connotes probing and critical examination of one's life, and the second—well, let's just say many of us have had nightmares because of what Hollywood thinks exorcisms look like. Yet if we understand the history of these initiation rites, we'll see that they are both more pastoral and comforting than we may think. Two related actions in the earliest ritual books of the church, exorcisms and scrutinies seemed to be separate events celebrated sometimes on a daily basis. One of these early documents, called the Apostolic Tradition, notes that the catechumens' conduct was examined at a time just before their baptism. After this examination, the bishop laid hands daily on the catechumens and led prayers of exorcism over them until their baptism. The scrutinizing of the catechumens' lives was meant to prepare them for baptism, while the exorcisms served to prove that the scrutinies were working. The two rites were distinct yet related and were both loving acts of the church for the Elect. As fewer adults were being initiated and the number of infant baptisms increased, these two rites were condensed into one liturgy, like we have today. Yet, no longer were these rites seen as preparation for baptism. Rather they became somewhat obligatory rites done just before baptism as part of the tradition. By the 12th century, the Elect participated only in an exorcism on Saturday morning right before the baptismal liturgy. By the 17th century, even this was moved to the beginning of the baptismal rite itself—we still do this in today's Rite of Baptism of infants. Perhaps it was this diminishing, not only in time but also in meaning, that spurred on some of our more negative connotations of these two rituals. The scrutinies consistently served as a way of ritually assessing one's readiness for baptism, but what they investigated changed from one generation to the next. They scrutinized spiritual development, moral behavior, intellectual understanding, and even the intelligence of godparents. By the time of the reforms of the Second Vatican Council the scrutinies had been transformed into a series of exorcisms invoked within the baptismal liturgy, in Latin, where no real scrutinizing was expected.

Renewing the purpose With the renewal of the initiation rites, the scrutiny is meant not simply to critique and assess one's readiness—readiness was established at the Rite of Election with the godparents' testimony and the bishop's acceptance of the catechumens' names. The purpose of each of the scrutinies is “to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the Elect” and “to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good” (RCIA, 141). The true pastoral sense of this two-fold act of uncovering and strengthening is emphasized in the next sentence of 141: “For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the Elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ.” At its core, the scrutinies are not about the sinfulness of the Elect but about the overwhelming grace of God in Christ. The exorcisms are not fear-laden bouts with Satan but are grace-filled encounters with the healing power of the Spirit. The scrutinies are mainly for the “Elect, but the faithful are encouraged to join in the scrutinies to also benefit from them. We are all in need of conversion throughout our lives, so we join with the “Elect” in scrutinizing our lives, and we too pray for the grace to overcome the power of sin that infects our hearts.
