Did you know...

St. Agnes is one of the most famous early Christian virgin martyrs and is mentioned in one of the Eucharistic prayers of the Mass. There is no reliable information about her birth, life, or death. According to legend, she was a beautiful girl, the daughter of a Roman noble. Agnes was raised as a Christian and consecrated herself to Christ. She became a martyr at the age of 12 or 13 during emperor Diocletian's reign because she refused to marry the prefect's son. As the story goes, when some men tried to take advantage of young Agnes, her hair grew, covering her up and protecting her virginity. A young man, whom she refused, reported her to the authorities for being a Christian. Agnes was arrested and sentenced to death by burning. Tradition says that the flames did not consume Saint Agnes, so she was beheaded. She was buried in a catacomb near Rome, where Constantine's daughter built a basilica in her honor. We celebrate her feast day on January 21st. Saint Agnes, pray for us.
